VACANCY FOR LITTER WARDEN

Burghfield Parish Council currently has a vacancy for a litter warden to join our existing team of Litter Wardens to start as soon as possible. Applications are invited from suitable persons for this valuable role.

The purpose of the job is to provide an efficient service in keeping areas within a

set route of the parish clear of litter. Main responsibilities include clearing litter from Clayhill Road, Hawksworth Road, Reading Road and School Firs, to monitor litter bins in the above area's and report any problems to the parish council.

You will be contracted for 8 to 10 hours per

week with payment being made in line with the National Living Wage.

Burghfield Defibrillators

Burghfield Parish Council works with local partners to install life-saving “HeartStart “ AED devices

Burghfield Parish Council has partnered with the Burghfield Community Facebook Page and The Hatch Gate Inn Management Team to install a second Parish Council funded AED* Public Access Defibrillator for use by residents and businesses who live near around the Hatch in Burghfield Village. This public AED now joins the one outside the Burghfield Parish Community Centre in Burghfield Common and they are available 24 hours a day. Buddy Mashiur, of The Hatch Gate Inn and Burghfield Spices in Burghfield Village has been instrumental in driving this through!



What is an AED Defibrillator?

If someone collapses and stops breathing then that person has gone into “Cardiac Arrest There are around 60,000 out of hospital patient cardiac arrests each year.”By quickly applying the external pads from an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to the bare chest of a patient and then following the verbal instructions given by the unit , it could help save a life. If required, the device will help you to deliver a small electric shock that may help recalibrate their heart and get them to breathe for themselves again. Every single minute that someone is not breathing

effectively reduces their chance of survival by 10% ... time is critical!

You MUST ring 999 first to gain the security access code for the unit. This will also alert the emergency services to come to your aid.

Public AEDs are designed to be easily and safely used by any member of the public and there are 1000’s of them being installed across the UK. Here in Burghfield there are 7 AEDs that we know of (2 of which are 24/7 Public access), the others are available during various premises open hours from places like the Burghfield Health Centre. In addition the local NHS Responders carry 4 of their own mobile units in response to 999 calls and the Parish Council are now working with Burghfield Community Facebook Page who are donating a further 3 units for Public Access installation around the Parish over the coming months!

Where are the Parish AEDS?

When someone collapses, the FIRST thing to do is call 999 and tell the operator your POST CODE or location. This will help them decide which is the nearest available AED based on your circumstances. If you are alone with your patient you should commence CPR under their instruction but if there are others around, you may be advised to send someone to get your nearest AED.

AED locations and availability are updated all the time. South Central Ambulance Service (SCAS) have released an App for Apple and Android Phones which will show you **YOUR LOCATION** and also the **LOCATION** and **AVAILABILITY** of your **NEAREST AED**.


Remember, **ALWAYS dial 999** first and they will assist you. If the person is not breathing or not breathing properly– say “CARDIAC ARREST”.

Burghfield & Mortimer Volunteer Bureau

The Burghfield & Mortimer Volunteer Bureau was set up to assist elderly local people in getting to Hospital, Dentist, Doctors, Physio appointments. The volunteer drivers in the last financial year did 1,383 journeys, collecting, taking and waiting to return clients back to their home.

There are “suggested contributions” for the most regular journeys, £12 to and from the Royal Berkshire Hospital, and £5 to the Mortimer Surgery and back.

The drivers get a standard fuel allowance, based on the length of journey

from their home, transporting their passenger to and from their appointment and finally returning to their own home. We have a number of excellent and helpful drivers, but if we had a few more, it would spread the load for our current ones.

The office volunteers phone volunteer drivers to ask if they are available for a specific day and time, and the driver has the choice of accepting the drive or not.

The volunteer driver has a log sheet to record journeys, time taken, mileage, and who was taken and to where. These are

handed into the office and payment is then made by the Treasurer, for miles travelled. We are fortunate to get a subsidy allowance from West Berkshire Authority, to enable the service to be offered at such good value.

Burghfield Rural Crimes Update

As we move in to the warmer weather and lighter evenings we are beginning to see an increase in reports of off-road motorbikes riding around Burghfield and Mortimer, particularly in the wooded areas.

Our response to such reports will often be to gather detailed information from members of the public which will assist in identifying those involved. If an opportunity arises to capture any photographs or footage of the motorbikes and/or the riders, without placing yourselves in harm's way and only if it is safe to do so, then this may also help in trying to identify those involved. If we are able to identify those involved and have sufficient evidence, then we can deal with them for any offences that have been committed. We have also seen an increase in reports of criminal damage in the area, whereby



properties and vehicles have been damaged by stones, possibly being shot by catapults. We are working hard trying to identify those involved and again need the help of the community by reporting incidents.

We rely on the information you provide us, so I would urge you to report it to us via 101, the non-emergency number. You can also report crimes online via the

Thames Valley Police Website www.thamesvalley.police.uk by clicking on the red button "Report a crime or road traffic incident".

You can contact the local neighbourhood policing team via email PangbourneNHPT@thamesvalley.pnn.police.uk. Alternatively you can report anonymously via Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111, or on their website. www.crimestoppers-uk.org.

Finally I would like to encourage residents to sign up to Thames Valley Alert, where you can receive emails about crimes in your area as well as messages warning about the latest scams.

Neighbourhood Development plan - NDP

A Vision for Burghfield

A Group established by Burghfield Parish Council is currently formulating a Neighbourhood Development Plan for the Parish. This is a community document that will help to shape the future of Burghfield by establishing general policies for development and the use of land. West Berkshire Council's revised Local Plan will determine the number of new houses to be built, but the NDP will have considerable influence over location and character of any new development. It

will also seek to ensure the provision of adequate infrastructure and to protect from development open areas that are of particular importance to the local community and environment. Production of the NDP will involve extensive public consultation. It will then be subject to independent examination, and the final document can only be adopted if the local community support it at referendum. Once adopted, it will form part of the Development Plan for West Berkshire and will carry considerable weight in determining planning applications.

As part of the consultation process we presented a draft of our Vision for the future of Burghfield at a public meeting held during April 2017. It met with general approval from those present. We now wish to ascertain the views of the whole community. You will find a statement of the Vision circulated as a separate paper with this edition of the Newsletter, together with a brief questionnaire. We would be grateful if as many people as possible could find time to respond to the questionnaire.

This article looks at a further man who died in the First World War and who is remembered on St Mary's memorial.


A E Manners Died 10 July 1918 Aged 37

Albert Edward was born and raised in Burghfield with his 11 siblings. He followed his older brother George into the Army, serving as a corporal with the 17th Lancers during the Boer War period. In 1900 he wrote to his family to say, "he

would have gone to the front with his regiment, only he met with an accident from the kick of a horse and has had to stay in barracks at Ballincolig (Ireland) much to his disappointment". On leaving the Army he joined the police in 1903, being dismissed shortly after for drinking whilst on duty at Ascot races. He spent the following 6 years working on the railway, first as a porter and then briefly as a signalman before being demoted back to porter for "signalling a goods train when the line was already occupied". He was mobilised in August 1914 and was sent to France with the 16th Lancers as part of the British Expeditionary Force, later transferring to the Labour Corp in 1917. He died in hospital on 10 July 1918, reportedly of a gastric complaint, and is buried in Belfast City Cemetery.

Burghfield and Mortimer Handy Bus

The Burghfield and Mortimer Handybus is a 'not for profit' local Charity, run by volunteers, providing transport for the elderly and less able members of our local community. We operate in Burghfield, Mortimer and the surrounding villages. We run a 14 seater minibus adapted for wheelchair use and easy passenger access, to provide the following services –

Shopping : three days a week, to Sainsbury's Calcot and Sainsbury's Tadley, with a pickup and drop off from home addresses and with a volunteer escort to manage user's shopping bags from the supermarket trolley to their front door.

Clubs and Societies : we support several local organisations by supplying transport for their members who would otherwise find it difficult, or impossible, to attend without this service.

Reading and Newbury: On Tuesdays we run a service to either Reading or Newbury on alternative weeks, picking up

from, and returning to, user's homes, or at a convenient location, and dropping off in



the centre of the town.

Outings: A number of times a year we run day excursions to places of interest or to the coast.

Medical appointments: the minibus is fitted with a wheelchair lift which enables the transport of wheelchair bound users who would otherwise have difficulty with other forms of transport.

To help cover some of our costs in providing these services we charge a nominal fare for each journey.
